Dear friends

I wish a happy New Year to all in the Steeple family! It is a real joy to daily walk the road of faith with you. In 2019 I want the Steeple to be a people and place of hope for everyone – beginning in Sunday worship. You know there is a tradition in Reformed churches of having a ‘call to worship’ at the beginning and a ‘benediction’ at the end. They have been described as the ‘book-ends’ of worship. We remind each other why we are there to worship and close by blessing the world of which we are a part. Previous ministers opened with a scripture sentence and closed with a biblical blessing.

Today in the Steeple we begin with a responsive reminder of the goodness of God. Then at the end of the service we stand together to offer our ‘praise’ to Jesus Christ – we bless His holy name! Then we pronounce ‘hope’ on the universe. ‘Cosmos’ is a Greek word (used in John 3:16) that refers to all that has been created. Then we pronounce ‘peace’ on the city. Dundee is tiny compared to the megacities of the world but most people on this planet live in cities of under half a million. Then we urge the church to have ‘courage’! We need to act boldly in response to the trials and tribulations of our times.

After Sunday morning worship we do not have to wait for Monday morning to feel the force of secular culture. For Sunday is now as busy a shopping day as Saturday. The High Street ‘hustle and bustle’ of Winter, Christmas and New Year sales give people hope of a bargain. Shopping online and in stores has become a kind of therapy. But Jesus has promised contentment and never to leave us if we keep ourselves from the love of money. (Heb. 13: 5-6) No amount of purchases can buy us into God’s presence. For God has already made the greatest ‘Special Offer’ the world has ever seen. When it seems that our credit balance is empty, God comes to all who seek Him.

The Steeple provides that opportunity. Thank you for helping to make the refurbished space so attractive and flexible. Thank you that in November we could celebrate the paying off of the loan to General Trustees with a ceilidh. While we let the space out to local authorities and organizations, we have also seen its potential to engage people. It provides a place where we can personally talk with people (whether they are local from Dundee or visitors for the V&A). What was said by the Japanese architect of the V&A could also be applied to the Steeple.... it can be a ‘living room’ for everyone!

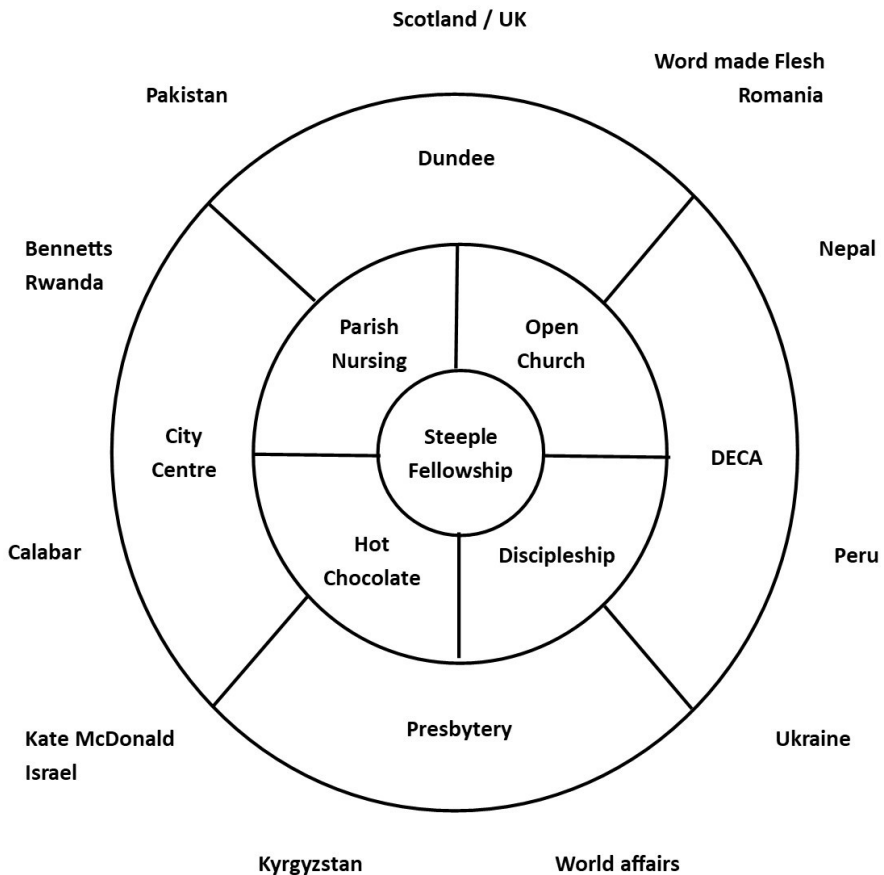

FINANCE UPDATE

Congregational Giving January to November

Our congregation continue to be generous givers but there has been a reduction in giving from 2017. Taking into account inflation the effective reduction is approximately 6%.

In addition to financial support many people give of their time to help with hall lets. In the current year hall lets income is predicted to be in the region of £50,000. We have managed to finance a number of improvements in 2018 but next year we are expecting to fund remedial works for the organ. In addition, expenditure is exceeding budget in the current year so any improvement work is being put on a temporary hold until we can assess ongoing income and expenditure in 2019.

A commitment has been made to assist with the running costs of Parish Nursing by transferring £5,000 to the project in 2019. A part-time Caretaker is in post and this is being funded from hall lets income.

There has recently been a comprehensive report on storage in the Church and Mary Slessor Centre. The Congregational Board will be looking at this in the new year including the financial implications of any decisions taken.

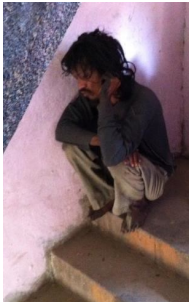
